
Relax and take it easy with our recommended cosy reads






Cosy Crime/Mystery

Cosy mysteries are novels where the murder takes place off stage or rather off page. Allowing the reader to focus on the puzzle of the mystery not the gory reality of the murder. Often told from the view point of an amateur sleuths, someone who just happens to have all sorts of convenient connections to help solve the mystery. M.C. Beaton and her two most popular characters **Agatha Raisin** and Hamish **Macbeth** are classics in this genre and a great starting point. Other good options include **The Case of the Bro**ken Doll by Alison Golden, The Country Inn Mystery by Faith Martin or Deadly Primrose by Suzette A. Hill










Cosy (kinda) Characters



Maeve Binchy is the queen of cosy. The Circle of Friends and Firefly Summer novels are gently reflecting the changing times of Ireland in the 50's and 60's without delving

too deep into the political or social changes afoot. It is often said that Maeve Binchy is never snide or cruel with her writing and I can't think





of anything cosier. Authors with a similar feel include **The Teahouse on Mulberry Street** by Sharon Owens, Freya **North's Little Wing** or Erica James in her 2022 book **Mothers and Daughters**. All these explore family dramas, old secrets being uncovered and the desire to belong to a family and a place either through tradition or discovery.
